LB: « Fair and balanced: does it still make sense in the new European reality? »

AK: « You cannot be neutral when your country is attacked, but still you can be objective » « full scale war, full scale coverage, full scale resistance... »

TT : being impartial even if we cannot have journalists in Russia... Mentioning it in our reports. Wearing ukrainian colors...

JS: belief from certain people that being based in Moscow has an impact on one journalist's ability to report in an independent way, without feeling the pressure or getting expelled. Example of Steve Rosenberg, BBC's editor, living in Moscow for 30+ years. Married to a Russian woman, father of two boys who identify as Russians.

David Regev, Second Authority for Television and Radio, Jerusalem: in Israel, censor sits in the newsroom and, when there is an attack, tells journalists what may or may not be broadcasted. Same in Ukraine? AK says that may be the case (« but I doubt it») in the public broadcaster, but, to his knowledge, not in other medias.

JS: there is no censorship for foreign journalists working in Ukraine, as far as « people like us » are concerned.

- ...a region held by Russian troops...
