



132994295	Meeting, chatting, hanging with our peers. There is nothing like it. Oh yes, and attending to very rich presentations and discussions.






SESSION: Ethics and the big digital platforms: will they ever be regulated?


SESSISON: Africa's dilemma: State control of the media vs self-regulation


SESSION: Do journalists really know their own codes?


SESSION: The growth in physical and online assaults on journalists













133085984	Maybe it is just at question of cultural diffences, but too many speakers are slightly too unspecified in their contributions. I learn a lot more from examples and shared




How easy was it to interact one-on-one with other delegates?

What was the impact of sharing our meeting with the African Media Councils?






How was the closing dinner?






Pre-recorded videos in some sessions (for instance, from Israel and Argentina) are an acceptable substitute for more interactive methods such as having speakers on Zoom.








The conference should go an extra day, even if it becomes more expensive.








There should be more/longer breaks between sessions.
